

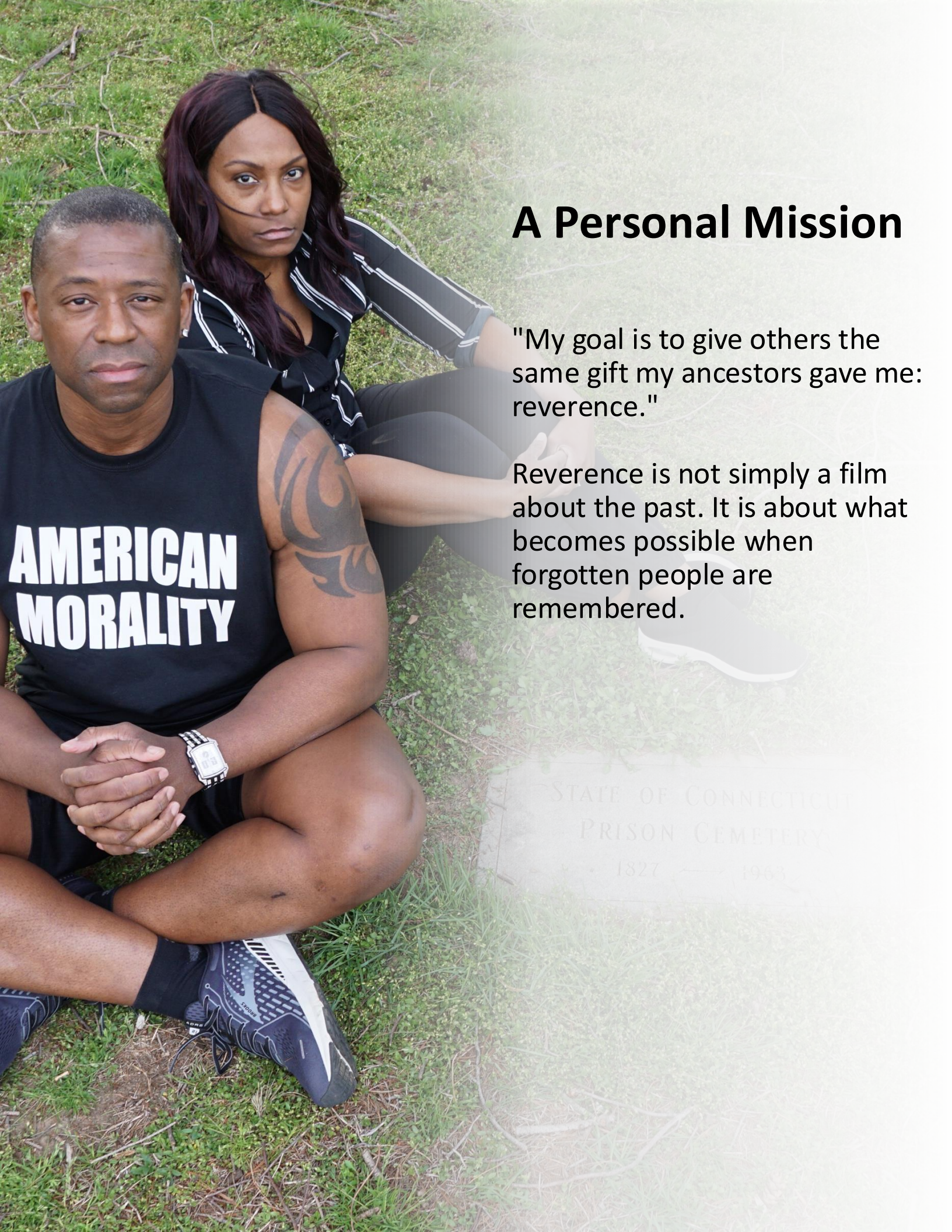

Reverence is not simply a film about the past. It is about what becomes possible when forgotten people are remembered.

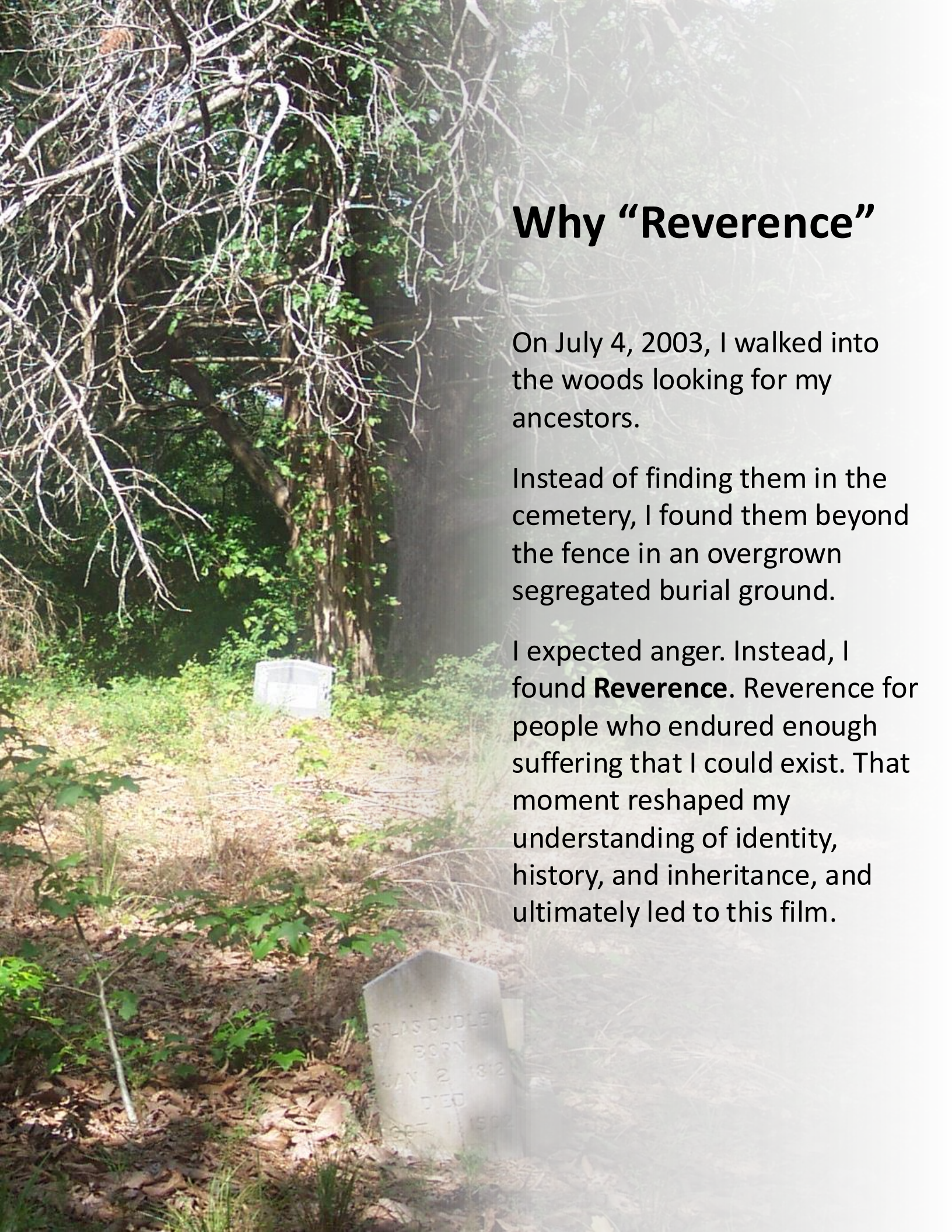


My Journey

I wanted to make sure my daughter never arrived at that same place.”

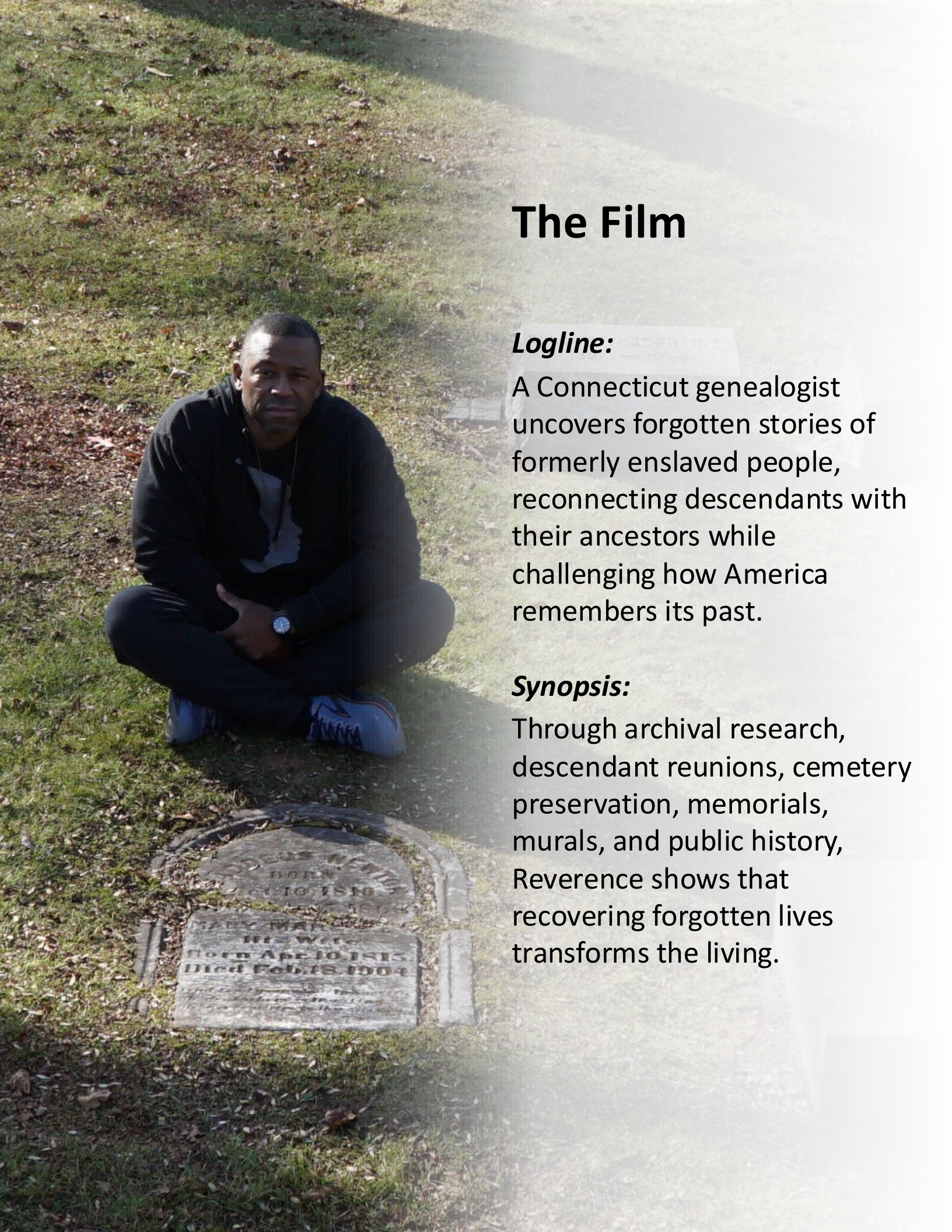


Why “Reverence”

On July 4, 2003, I walked into the woods looking for my ancestors.

Instead of finding them in the cemetery, I found them beyond the fence in an overgrown segregated burial ground.

I expected anger. Instead, I found **Reverence**. Reverence for people who endured enough suffering that I could exist. That moment reshaped my understanding of identity, history, and inheritance, and ultimately led to this film.

The Film

Logline:

A Connecticut genealogist uncovers forgotten stories of formerly enslaved people, reconnecting descendants with their ancestors while challenging how America remembers its past.

Synopsis:

Through archival research, descendant reunions, cemetery preservation, memorials, murals, and public history, Reverence shows that recovering forgotten lives transforms the living.

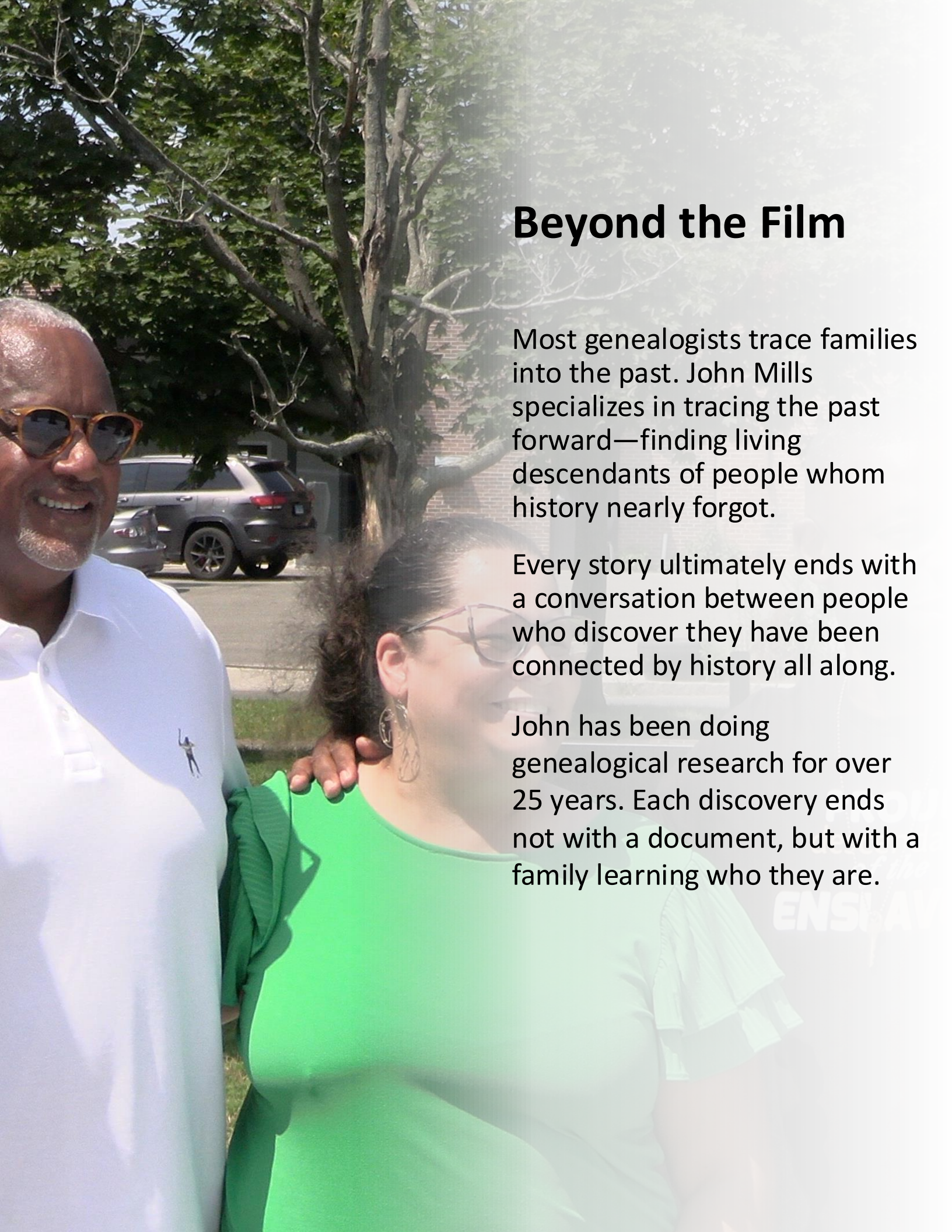

About John Mills

John Mills is an author, filmmaker, public historian, and genealogist whose work reconnects descendants with forgotten ancestral stories through archival research, documentary filmmaking, and public history.

John is also the president and founder of the **Alex Breanne Corporation**—a Connecticut-based non-profit focused on reconnecting descendants of formerly enslaved people with their ancestral stories.

John's work has been featured by *The Kelly Clarkson Show*, *The Washington Post*, Connecticut Public Television, *Junior Scholastic*, and *The Areva Martin Show*. He is the author of *The Narrative of Primus* and a contributor to *A Century in Captivity*.

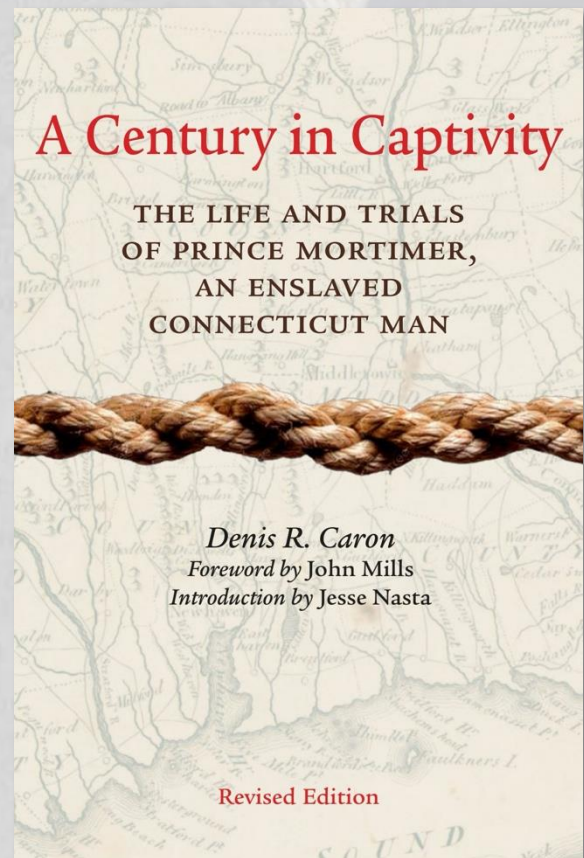
Published Works
